Vintage Advertising

Perhaps it comes as no surprise how artistic this 1937 advertisement for GMC trucks is, considering that it was the first model year that benefited from GM's Art & Colour Department under Harley Earl.

Prior to this, the majority of truck ads spoke of durability and capacity and operating costs. Now it was also about looking good.

Stylists reworked the art deco grille, moved the headlights from the fenders to the sides of nose and dreamed up a dozen two-tone paint schemes.

The 1937 GMC pickups featured Oldsmobile's 230 cubic inch engine, a step up from the previous year, which had the smaller 213 cubic inch Olds offering.

- 6. The club will inquire about AACA insurance covering a weekly cruise night at the Elks Club on Richmond Avenue and Arthur Kill Road.
- 7. We discussed the idea of a "sponsored" 50/50, where a beneficiary is named to share the proceeds.
- 8. Phil Boffa gave a treasury report, with all in order.
- 9. The meeting was adjourned at 8:41 pm. The 50/50 collected \$29, with Mike Signorile winning \$15.

Inside the SIRAACA Garage

Bob Columbia is the happy owner of this 1968 Mustang, one of the more recent additions to the SIRAACA Garage.

Like many collectors, Bob yearned to acquire one of the cars from his past. Having bought a new Mustang just like this one in 1968, he'd had his sights on getting another, preferably in the same color scheme of Acapulco Blue with black vinyl top. His original was ordered with black interior, but his was delivered with parchment interior instead. He finally gets the black insides this time around.

By December of 1967, the 289 V-8 was finally gone in favor of the 302, which put out 230 hp. Three body styles made up the Mustang line - the coupe, the fastback, and the convertible. The coupe dominated production, accounting for nearly 250,000 of the 317,404 cars made in 1968. Considering some additional differences, the least common was a fastback deluxe with bench seat. Only 256 such equipped cars rolled off the line.

Bob's car is a real looker, and his attention to some cosmetic details is all that's needed now.
