## Vintage Advertising

Staten Island prepares to say farewell to 2017 under bitter cold and snowy conditions, so we selected this ad for a 1940 Nash to highlight its Weather Eye. The Weather Eye system began in 1938 when Nash developed the first auto heater to warm fresh air with hot engine water within a heater core. In 1939 they added a thermostat to the system, and this setup is the basis for use in cars today.

The ad also mentions that owning a Nash means it costs less to go places. Not only was the engine economical by getting more than 21 mpg, but the car featured a convertible bed that saved on lodging. Of course, to keep from freezing to death, you had to keep the car running all night so the Weather Eye could keep you warm. So much for 21 mpg.

1. The 511th meeting of the Staten Island Region AACA was called to order in the midst of the club's Holiday Party by President Paul Jr. to conduct the year's final business.



### When Antique Cars Were Just Used Cars

Here is a clipping from the Advance classifieds from 1953 or so, listing used cars for sale. Many makes no longer exist today, like Plymouth, Studebaker, DeSoto and Oldsmobile. That fifteen year old Ford sedan would set you back \$145, which is still only \$1,340 in today's dollars. And what became of Island Motor Sales at 1260 Hylan Boulevard? That address is now the shopping center that houses Bocelli Restaurant, near Honda of Staten Island. Island Chevrolet has a small ad with an address of 1316 Castelton Avenue, which is now Spray City and other repair and upholstery shops. The rest of this page also had ads from Wagner's Garage, Packard West Brighton, Ray's Studebaker, Staten Island Motor, Inc (an authorized Hudson dealer), Bentley Motor Sales and a Willys dealer on Victory Boulevard. We'll dig deeper into those on a later date.

#### Inside the SIRAACA Garage

Some time back we peeked into the SIRAACA Garage for a glimpse of Andrew Napoli's 1950 Ford Custom Deluxe convertible. At that time, Andrew was cleaning it up and determining his next steps. Now that he's taken all of those steps (new paint, new interior, new chrome, etc.), here's the finished product.

Sitting at the top of Ford's lineup along with the Crestliner and other Custom Deluxe models, the convertible sports a 239 cubic inch V-8 rated at 100 horsepower. Ford produced 50,299 convertibles at a factory price of \$1,948. The only Ford that cost more that year was the Custom Deluxe two-door wagon, which ran \$2,107.

Andrew did much of the restoration himself, and the results are fantastic. He tells us it's a great car for local runs and shows, but not so much for highway driving. As such, a good number of us Staten Islanders will need to go to New Jersey to see it in person, as we did at the Delicious Orchards Apple Fest. Alternately, you could make Andrew an offer and bring it home yourself.

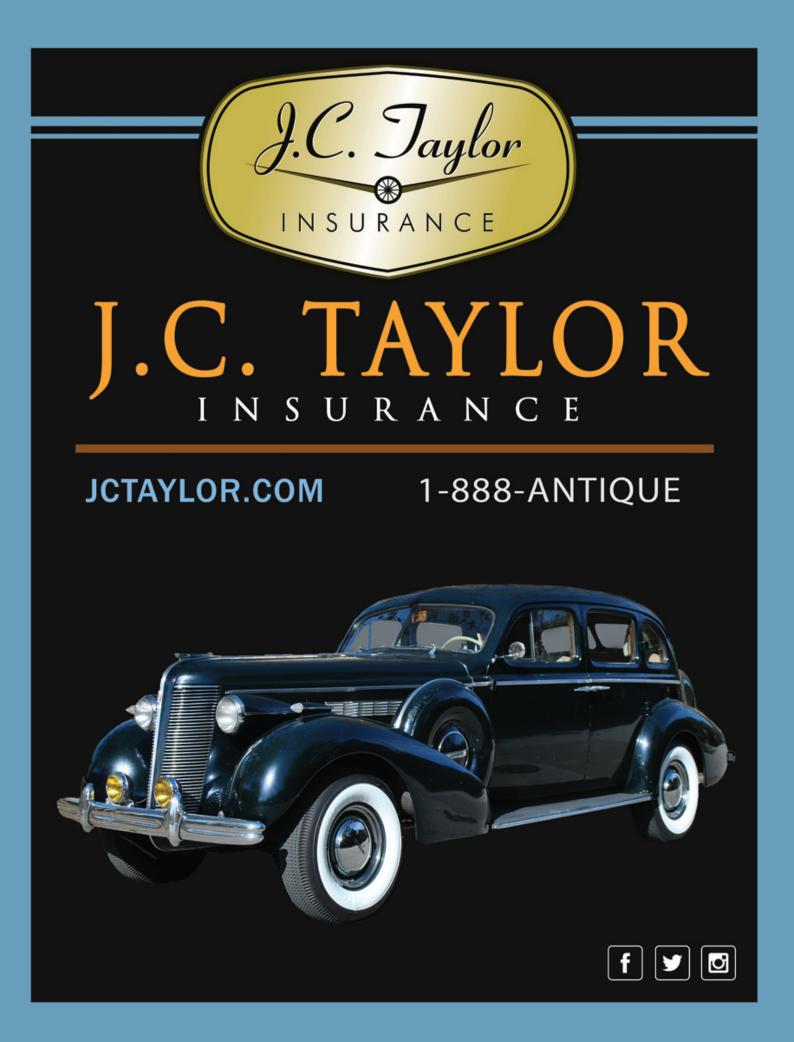
