


# Vintage Advertising

Packard, a name synonymous with luxury automobiles, was also a formidable name in trucking during the early part of the 20th century. This ad from 1911 points out the reliability of their trucks by citing one in use in Pittsburgh. It replaced three teams of horses and hadn't missed a trip over 15 months of hauling across the hilly streets of Pittsburgh.

That same year, a Packard truck set a record by driving from New York to San Francisco in 46 and one-half days. In all, Packard produced about 40,000 large trucks from 1905 through 1923, seeing many serve overseas in WWI.

The company in the ad, Arbuckles & Company, was a pioneer in roasted coffee and eventually settled in Brooklyn as the largest coffee company in America.

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# Minutes of the 516th Meeting May 1, 2018

- 5. Other events in early June include the New Dorp High School show on June 3 and the Kiwanis show on June 10. The raffle car will be at both events as well.
- 6. Artie Guarnieri presented some club jacket choices and members selected their favorites. The board will decide on how to proceed.
- 7. Phil Boffa provided a treasury report, with all in order.
- 8. A thank you letter from Michael's Cause was read aloud to the members.
- 9. The meeting was adjourned at 9:01. The 50/50 collected \$33, with Mike DiPilato winning \$17.

### Cars and Cones at Richmond Town

The 1920's-era diner built on the grounds of Richmond Town many years ago for the filming of HBO's Boardwalk Empire was left standing when production ended. It looked right at home in the center of the village, but served no purpose other than a neat backdrop for photos.

That's no longer the case as the building has been outfitted to house Egger's Ice Cream. The club was invited to provide a handful of cars for the grand opening ceremony. Parked outside was Tony Ventrice's Model T along with Paul Arena's 1948 Dodge and Paul Jr.'s 1967 Cutlass. Attendees were treated to free samples of cones, sundaes, ice cream filled donuts and old fashioned candy.

Egger's will be open seven days a week, from 11:00 am to 10:00 pm Sunday through Thursday, and to 11:00 pm on Fridays and Saturdays. This is the first of several initiatives to build a foundation for visitors to return regularly to the village. We are looking to relaunch a weekly cruise night on Wednesdays to continue the momentum. The club will meet with their development committee to sort out logistics and address the possibility of additional food options. Recall that our first round of cruise nights there were well received but fell short of providing options for food, not to mention a thin crowd of spectators.

#### AACA Presents 2018 Zenith Award

From over 3,500 vehicles that were shown at eight AACA national meets last year, 16 were selected to compete for the honor of best restored vehicle in the form of the Zenith Award. The nominees gathered at the Grand National meet in Greensburg, PA for a six hour evaluation. In the end, a 1935 Packard 1204 Super 8, one of only 11 known surviving examples, took the top honor. The 16 finalists represented a wide range of vehicles, mirroring the many choices our hobby offers collectors and enthusiasts. They also include a 1919 Walker electric truck, a 1958 Cadillac Eldorado Biarritz convertible, a 1937 Chrysler Imperial town car, a 1957 Chevy Bel Air convertible, a 1959 DeSoto Adventurer convertible, a 1960 Corvette, a 1953 Nash Healy (photo below, the runner-up), a 1956 Mercury Montclair, a 1934 Ford Cabriolet, a 1970 Chevelle SS, a 1931 Studebaker Regal roadster, a 1961 Chevrolet Impala convertible, a 1927 Cadillac roadster, a 1972 Ford Gran Torino Sport, and a 1926 Ford Model TT dump truck.



## Outside the SIRAACA Garage

This month, we venture outside the SIRAACA Garage for a look at a car that belongs to Andy Barcellona. Andy is a Jersey guy, and has accompanied many of our members on our trips to AACA national events. Andy is also kind enough to volunteer and judge at our fall show. This is his 1957 Chevrolet 210 station wagon. Andy recently won his First Grand National Award in Greensburg, PA.

So what's a Chevy "Two-Ten"? It was a midrange model from Chevy from 1953 -1957, known previously as the Styleline DeLuxe before becoming the Biscayne. 210's were quite popular in 1957, nearly matching Bel Air production totals. A fair amount of flash compared with a lower price helped sales. Four door wagons came in Townsman and Beauville models, depending on the number of passengers they held. Andy's is the six-passenger Townsman. The nine-passenger is the Beauville.

Andy is the second titleholder of this car, which had 63,000 miles when he purchased it. A nearly full restoration followed, although the door panels, headliner, stainless trim and glass are original to the car.

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## Horseless Carriages Aren't the Only Auction Stars

From time to time the club newsletter highlights some upcoming auctions or auction results. Being an antique auto club, those are the lots we feature. Yet what about our auto ancestors, the horse drawn carriages. What do they fetch at auction?

Three such carriages were recently displayed along 6th Avenue in Manhattan as a preview of the massive Christie's sale of Peggy & David Rockefeller's collection of everything and anything. The large fourseater in the top photo is an Extension Top Surrey dating to the early 20th century. Its presale estimate was between \$1,500-\$2,000. The small two seater in the bottom photo is said to be a late 18th or early 19th century carriage known as a Hooded Spider Phaeton. Its estimate was \$12,000-\$14,000. A third carriage (in the back of the top photo) is known as a T-Cart, made by Brewster & Co. on Broome Street, circa 1875. It was expected to fetch between \$4,000-\$6,000.

So how did these do? Incredibly, the estimates of all three were way off. The Surrey and T-Cart each sold for \$81,250. The much older Phaeton crushed it with a realized price of \$225,000! Clearly, more than one buyer showed up wanting these wheels. Speaking of wheels, the hubs on the phaeton say "A.T. Demarest & Co. N.Y. 5th Ave, & 33d St." These have to date from after 1890, when they moved there from Broadway & Bleecker, so appear to be replacements. Like most carriage makers, Demarest evolved to make custom automobile bodies for such marques as Renault and Benz, plus do repair work for LeBaron.
