1980 marked the 25th anniversary of the Thunderbird. Ford introduced a smaller car that year in three models - a base Coupe (bottom), a Town Landau (center) and a Silver Anniversary edition (top). Changing tastes in car buyers led personal luxury coupes to fall out of favor, with T-Bird sales falling from over 284,000 units in 1979 to 156,803 units in 1980. Sales would continue to plummet for this body style, dropping to 86,693 in 1981 and 45,142 in 1982, exacerbated by a poor economy.

We're unsure of survival rates, but these models are well-equipped, good looking and V-8 powered. Seeing one at a car show would be a real treat.

The Mullin Automotive Museum, home to one of the world's largest Bugatti collections, streams live tours from its California home on Instagram Live each Tuesday at 1:00 pm (@MullinMuseum). Michigan's **Gilmore Car Museum** offers free streaming video of its lecture series on its Facebook page and YouTube channel. The National Corvette Museum in Bowling Green, Kentucky has a free video series updated each weekday on its Facebook page and YouTube channel. Episodes go live at 11:00 am. A second series that decodes Corvette history runs around 5:00 pm on Tuesdays and Thursdays. The **Lane Motor Museum** in Nashville has a YouTube series called *Uncrating the Collection*. The **AACA Museum** has begun a series of virtual visits directly on its website, aacamuseum.org. The Petersen Automotive Museum in Los Angeles is also streaming hour long vault tours to provide rare looks at what vehicles are not on display there. You may have to make a suggested donation for admission, at petersen.org. Some museums are also focusing on school kids with programs that combine storytelling with follow along activities, such as The Henry Ford in Dearborn, Michigan, the Indianapolis Motor Speedway Museum, and the NASCAR Hall of Fame in Charlotte, North Carolina.
