Jetstar 88

Did you know? Ransom E. Olds is the only American automotive pioneer to sell at least one vehicle of each power mode: steam, electric, gas and diesel.

Vintage Advertising

Oldsmobile introduced a new price leader for their full-sized cars with the 1964 Jetstar 88. Think of it as a full-size 88 with components from their intermediate F-85 (Cutlass) models. That meant a 330 V8 and Jetaway two-speed automatic instead of a 394 and a three-speed. As a result, the Dynamic 88 moved up a notch, and the Super 88 entered its final year.

Olds also introduced a Jetstar I in 1964 to compete with the Pontiac Grand Prix. It was a lesser equipped Starfire, but its 394 was mated to the Jetaway transmission.

Jetstar 88 came in a 2-door hardtop and convertible, as well as a 4-door sedan and 4-door hardtop.

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Trivia Question: In 1977, Oldsmobile offered a standard four cylinder engine for the first time since 1922. What subcompact model featured that engine?

Answer: The Starfire, in its third go around with Olds. It emerged again in 1975 with a Buick V6 before the switch to a four two years later.




Local & National Dues

Remembering "Gunner" and His Start

There may not be many members today who were in the club in its early years, perhaps only Paul Arena, who joined in 1976. Even so, there could be many more of you who know the name John Gunnell, also known as "Gunner". John was a member of our region in those early years, contributing artwork and articles and editing our newsletter (below left). He eventually left Staten Island with his 1953 Pontiac in 1978 for Iola, WI. Working at Krause Publications he not only wrote and then edited for Old Cars Weekly, but also penned many automotive history books, price guides, and Standard Catalogs. John passed away in August at the age of 75.

Inside the SIRAACA Garage

We return to The SIRAACA Garage this month with a look at one of the uncommon cars found inside. This is a 1959 Lancia Flaminia Berlina, owned by Don Bosco. It was acquired out of an estate in Rosebank, and its all-original interior features a rare MPH speedometer (below).

The Flaminia made its debut in 1957. It was named after a Roman road, which was a Lancia tradition. Berlina is an Italian name for a sedan.

Don's Lancia has a 2.5 liter six, and is one of 3,344 Berlinas built with that engine between the years of 1957 and 1970. Another 599 were built with 2.8 liter engines. The body design is by Pinin Farina.

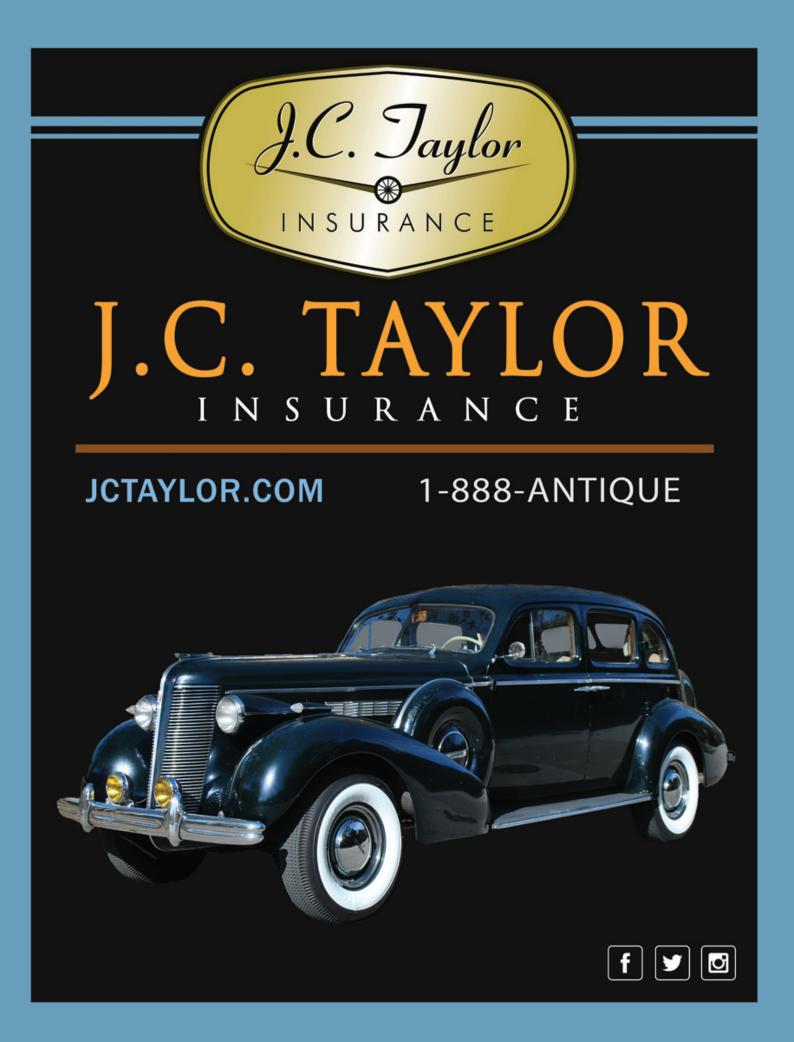


Hard to imagine this is a car from 1959, considering American cars that year were enormous, chrome-laden and finned to the heavens. (photos by Don Bosco).

The SIRAACA Time Machine

Following a successful trip back to 1914 last month, we were feeling good about the Time Machine and dialed in the Amboy Garage, circa 1921. Located at 3952 Amboy Road at the end of Giffords Lane, they were selling the Elgin, an auto that was built from 1919 through 1923. Unfortunately, our first attempt only got us back to 1955.

We gave the Time Machine a couple of minutes to recharge and tried again. The Amboy Garage is listed in the 1940 phonebook, so we traveled back another 15 years but there were no old Elgin cars in sight

The Amboy Garage was pumping Amoco instead of Esso at that time, and someone was putting air in the front left tire of his twodoor sedan when we happened by. The Elgin ad above was one of a few we found in The Advance. Another noted 1922 Elgin prices: a touring car was \$1,295, sports and roadsters were \$1,345, and sedans and coupes were \$2,350. Those were in line with other six cylinder cars of the day.



The car at left appears to be a 1938 Dodge, but we're not certain about the bread van. Perhaps it is a 1936 or so GMC. (photos courtesy of S.I. Historical Society)

Did you know? The Elgin Motor Car Company was formed by executives from the Elgin Watch Company. As a nod to its roots, the car was advertised with such slogans as "The Car of the Hour" and "Built Like a Watch".
