

Did you know? Henry Leland used a \$10,000,000 government contract to build V-12 Liberty engines as the basis for leaving GM and forming Lincoln in 1917.

Vintage Advertising

Welcome 2025 by looking back at this ad from 100 years ago, featuring one of the automobile brands still in production (even if they no longer make cars, only SUVs and crossovers). Lincoln Motor Company was founded in 1917, and acquired by Ford in 1922 for \$8,000,000.

Holbrook was a coachbuilder located on NYC's west side. When Edsel Ford realized that style played a big part of 1920's auto sales, he turned to coachbuilders like Holbrook, Brunn, Willoughby, LeBaron and Dietrich. Holbrook started supplying bodies to Lincoln in 1923. Their most popular style was this collapsible Cabriolet, first shown at the 1925 New York Auto Salon. About forty were built through 1929.

Inside the SIRAACA Garage

The ghosts of cars once owned by our members can be found within the walls of the SIRAACA Garage, and we just spotted this one. This was Tony DiAngelo's 1967 Chevrolet Nova SS. Tony owned this car during the 1980's, as evidenced by the second photo, which was taken during the Verrazano Bridge's 25th Anniversary parade across the span in 1989. Notice by then he'd removed the skirts seen in the top photo (a change your editor approves of).

Tony's was equipped with a six-cylinder, making it a fairly rare car. Per *Old Cars Weekly*, only 1,856 Nova SS models featured the six in 1967. Tony recalls using it as a daily driver back and forth to work in New Jersey, getting better gas mileage than his Road Runner's thirsty V-8 ever would.

The old photos differ in color exposure, so we're not sure (nor is Tony) if his car was painted Grenada Gold or Sierra Fawn. Either way, it had a black interior.

This is not the only Nova ghost within the walls of our garage. Next month we'll report on another one, with a sneak peek seen at the photo at the bottom right.

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The SIRAACA Time Machine

An early player on the automobile scene on Staten Island was Interborough Garage on the corner of Elm and the Terrace. This ad from 1909 advertises a pair of used cars for sale. Bargain No. 1 is a 1909 REO, which originally sold for \$1,275 and was not yet a full year old. Offered at \$800, and it came with extra "shoes" (tires). More interesting is bargain No. 2, a 1907 Grout 7-passenger touring, which originally cost \$3,000 and could be had for \$650. We cannot find any record of Grout making a long wheelbase 7-passenger touring that year, so the year could be wrong or the car was superrare. Grout started as a steam car, turning to gasoline in 1907. The Time Machine made a pass by the building in 1940, but it was empty or unmarked at the time. Here's what those cars looked like:




