We celebrate Independence Day with this 1919 ad for Patriot Motor Trucks. These were built by Hebb Motors, first formed in 1913 as the A.G. Hebb Auto Co. as a builder of delivery bodies for other trucks. They began building Patriot trucks in 1918.

With models such as the Revere, the Lincoln and the Washington, Hebb was leaning heavily into the American patriot theme.

Through a series of reorganizations, they changed the name of their truck to Woods beginning in 1927. Bodies for other trucks were built as Patriot until 1948.

6. The Food Truck Festival at Mt. Loretto is June 27, 28, and 29. Volunteers signed up to help with the raffle car all three days as well as the car show we have added for Saturday and Sunday.

7. Mike Gorgia presented an opportunity for the club to donate towards the restoration of a 1987 Caprice NYPD patrol car in honor of fallen policeman Eddie Byrne. The club voted to donate \$1,000 to their cause. The restored car will be then be displayed at the NYPD Academy.

8. Members are encouraged to attend the street naming ceremony for Frank Provenzano Jr. on Tuesday, July 8.

9. Congrats to Bob Columbia for picking up a 1977 Grand Prix.

10. Paul encouraged members to make use of the AACA Forums when seeking help with their cars.

11. Phil was not available to gave a treasury report this month.

12. The meeting was adjourned at 8:17. The 50/50 collected \$70. Bob Ferone won \$35.

Mt. Loretto Food Truck Festival Adds Car Show

This year we returned to Mount Loretto for their annual Food Truck Festival, with the added attraction of a "car show" in place for Saturday and Sunday. Leading up to the event, it was hard to tell what logistical issues would pop up during this new event. Would too many cars show up unannounced and overwhelm us? Would the weather cooperate? We shifted our approach in the final week as the expected number of participants was small, targeting an adjacent play area for the show's new location. Saturday began with the threat of lingering rain from the overnight hours, with approximately two dozen cars coming out. Club members added another nine or so cars to the display, giving the area a sense of fullness. By 3:30, award ribbons were given to ten cars as inaugural award winners. Sunday's turnout was better, with about 35 cars on display, allowing members to show their cars on a grassy area along the spectator walkway, which drew their attention to the other car area. Again, ten ribbons were presented that afternoon. The crowds seemed a little smaller than usual, although many in attendance chose to sit under the giant tent at the far side of the field to escape the blistering sun on Sunday. The raffle car performed well, taking in \$2385 over the weekend, just \$105 less than last year. We hope to gather as much feedback from everyone about this effort, so we encourage members to ask those who they know were there to give us their thoughts, good or bad, as we look to improve and grow next year.

We know of a number of birds that roost in the SIRAACA Garage, like Thunderbirds and Firebirds. They'll need to stay alert, because there is a cat calling the garage home as well. It's Bob Ferone's 1994 Mercury Cougar XR-7.

Bob just acquired this 7th generation Cougar, with a body style that debuted with the 1989 model. The 1994 model features a number of refreshed details, like a new grille, new wraparound interior design, and free floating side moulding. This year was the first for an optional 4.6L SOHC V-8, yet Bob's is equipped with the standard 3.8L V-6.

A total of 71,026 Cougars were built that year, and although we remember them as a popular car, we hardly see them any more.

1994 Cougars came in a choice of ten colors, and Bob's is painted Vibrant White, with blue interior and matching blue vinyl landau top. At summer's end, Bob will move the Cougar upstate, where it will be free to chase as many birds as it can spot in and around the Finger Lakes.

Before we fire up the SIRAACA Time Machine to travel somewhere and when in the past this month, how many of you were able to identify the 1933 Pontiac that was spotted in last month's trip? Not too hard, right? Here's another one for you as we head back about 85 years to 145 Arthur Kill Road, then home to Richmond Auto Parts. There are two identifiable cars parked here. The one in the background should be easy. The car in the foreground is still a brand today, even if its name appears on only two vehicles in 2025. Distinct features include the louver doors on the side of the hood. the rear bumper/spare, and the way the running board cover rolls up slightly into the front fender. On our way to the present day, We paused about halfway back time-wise for this alternate view facing Arthur Kill Road. Feel free to identify the pickup truck while you're at it. The site is now where Historic Richmond Town has its storage buildings, across from the United Hebrew Cemetery. A rumored slogan, based on an online discussion about the newer photo, was "If you don't buy auto parts from this side of the road, you may end up on the other side of the road."
