


With eyes towards spring, we still realize that winter is in full effect here, so we're presenting this snow-themed ad from 1910 for Pierce-Arrow. The art doesn't highlight the whole car, but rather focuses on the comfort afforded the wealthy patrons in the passenger compartment. Pity the poor, frozen driver, who bears the brunt of the winter storm in his open driver's seat.

The luxury market that year was dominated by the "Three P's" - Packard, Peerless, and Pierce-Arrow. 1910 saw Pierce-Arrow stop 4-cylinder production and offer only sixes, with three different models: 6-36, 6-48 and 6-66. All were strong and built to run faster than many roads could accommodate at the time. Prices ranged from \$3850 for a Model 36 runabout to \$7200 for a Model 66 landau.

Richmond Town's Transportation Building

As we continue to work out details about partnering with Historic Richmond Town to refurbish the transportation building into a permanent exhibit space, we realized that there may be some members who are not familiar with the site or the building. Here is a photo of the building as it appears now. The small structure with the tiled roof out front is a leftover scenic from the filming of Boardwalk Empire. It served as a small gas station, but the island with the old pumps was taken back by the production company. HRT plans to relocate that small building to another spot on their grounds. Not visible in this picture, behind that structure underneath the peaked overhang with the white columns, is a set of barn doors that afford access to the large open space within.



HRT has drafted a two-year plan towards completion of this project. The initial goal is to tackle the outside. The roof is new, but it needs fresh paint in a brighter color scheme. They are looking over a few historical colors that will suit the location. With a small budget, helped by our donations thus far, the project will rely heavily on community volunteers to do much of the work. A general timeline begins in late March with the relocation of the gas station, moving on to prep and paint in mid-to-late April. Early May is the target for any landscaping and repair to the cobblestone walkway. Then, in mid-May, the plan is to construct a false wall to create an area for a pair of display vehicles inside of the barn doors. If all goes according to plan, they will hold a ribbon cutting on June 2, 2018 at their Uncorked event. The second year then will focus on the interior renovation, which includes bathrooms, ceiling, paint, lighting, heat and AC. For this to work, we'll need to be actively providing volunteers for the various work. That doesn't have to mean we're the only ones digging and painting, but we should be able to draw upon friends, family and other organizations to lend a hand.

I met with the Buildings & Grounds Committee at Richmond Town a few weeks ago to hear about plans to bring the transportation building "back to life". By now, most of you heard that Raceway Park in Englishtown shut down all drag racing events. Supposedly, car shows and swap meets will continue, along with some other events that took place away from the quarter-mile. We'll monitor this closely to ensure we still have the Spring Swap Meet open to us for our raffle car.

Speaking of raffle cars, we still have interest in the 1989 Mustang that's wintering in the Poconos, with a tentative trip out west set for after February 15. That said, we are open to other cars that fit the bill.



Ford Model K For \$252K

Before the Model T, Ford manufactured an alphabet soup of other lettered models. From 1903 through 1908 there were Models A, B, C, F, K, N, R, and S. The K was Ford's Packard, a large, upscale auto powered by a 405 cubic inch inline six. The car weighed around 2400 pounds and sold for \$1 per pound. Almost 1000 Model K's were built between 1906 and 1908, and only 10 K roadsters are known to exist. One was featured in an early Ford display at the AACA Museum (see photo below). Another just sold at the RM Sotheby's auction in Scottsdale last month. That car, restored over 50 years ago and showing a great amount of wear, hammered for \$252,000.

From the SIRAACA Archives

We step outside the SIRAACA Garage and into the SIRAACA Archives for a glimpse back at the Best in Show winner at our first show on the Wagner College football field in 1979.

The car is a 1911 Hupmobile Model 20 Touring, owned at the time by Joe Martin of Bridgewater, NJ. According to a sign that accompanied the car, less than 100 were produced, and this was one of six known to exist. Further research for this article reveals that factory records show only 18 tourings cars built. In the end, it's what remains that defines its rarity.

A 1911 Hupmobile made history, when it rolled off the factory floor in early November, 1910 and was driven around the world, logging over 48,000 miles through 26 countries, taking 18 months to do so. That car still exists, and was on display at the 2009 Meadowbrook Concours d'Elegance. It is owned by the Crawford Auto-Aviation Museum in Cleveland.

Joe Martin's Hupmobile may be the same one seen at the New York Auto Show in 2016, on display with the Vintage Auto Museum of New Jersey. Perhaps our members know more?
