



This original ad for GM's Motorama of 1954 comes from The Staten Island Advance. The Motorama was GM's elaborately staged showcase of concept cars, song and dance routines and fashions of tomorrow. In '54, GM also toted the Frigidaire's Kitchen of Tomorrow.

Show cars on the turntables that vear included the 1954 Corvette Nomad and Corvette Corvair, the Oldsmobile Cutlass, the Pontiac Bonneville Special, the Firebird XP-21, and the Buick Wildcat II. All of these names eventually made it to production vehicles, although none looked like these dream cars.

Several still exist and make the rounds of high-end concours and other special shows.

Tucker #44 Update

Last year, we reported that Tucker #44 was up for sale at RM Auctions in Scottsdale. This was as close as a barn find as you'd get with a Tucker, as this car was known but unseen for over 30 years. It has less than 8,000 original miles, but was restored back in 1973, where it was repainted a dark brown color. We have learned that the car sold for more than \$1.3 million, and is no being redone in our backyard over at Rob Ida's shop in Morganville, NJ. Rob is the perfect choice to resurrect this car, as he is the one responsible for building modern Tucker hot rods after working with Preston Tucker's family to secure the rights to do so. He's also building from scratch the Tucker Torpedo prototype that led to the Tucker 48. The work in progress was recently shown at the AACA Museum in Hershey.

Pebble Beach is convening Tuckers this August to celebrate the car's 70th anniversary. Tucker #44 has been invited, so the clock is running on Rob to deliver. To follow what's being done to the car (which has been brought down to bare metal,, check out pictures of his work on the Facebook page of Ida Automotive. You'd be amazed to see they removed 165 pounds of original factory lead work used to speed up production of enough cars to prove he was legit. There is an online video of Rob running the Tucker on a dynamometer on Motorhouse-media.com. That site also has Rob and the new owner discovering the last remnants of the car's original green paint hiding on one of its wheels.

We plan on following Rob's work up to the final hours, when the August deadline for Pebble Beach comes along. Will it be done in time to make the show? Will it compete for time to finish the '46 Torpedo recreation, which has also been invited to appear at Pebble Beach? In the SIRAACA Garage

We are returning to the SIRAACA Garage to look at this year's raffle car, a 1989 Ford Mustang LX 5.0 convertible.

A quick bit of research shows that Ford built 10,575 LX 5.0 convertibles in 1989, compared to 19.417 GT 5.0 convertibles. Only the LX 5.0 notchback sedan was produced in smaller numbers, and not by much at 10,528 units.

Ford offered three shades of red in 1989, including Bright Red (code 21), Medium Scarlet (code 2D) and Cabernet Red (code 2H). Our car is Medium Scarlet. Bright Red is interestingly the rarest of the three, with only 368 LX ragtops sporting that shade. Even the other shades are fairly low runs, with 1,499 Cabernets and 1,207 Scarlets. In case you are wondering, Almond is the rarest with just 127, and Oxford White tops at 3,141.

Yes, it's powered by the venerable 5.0, good for 220 horsepower. It also sports plaid cloth interior, and we're still researching how common or uncommon that option was.



Here is the poster for our upcoming Spring Dust-Off. It's a tribute to the 50th Anniversary of Hot Wheels, mimicking the original packaging of the small diecast cars that became a world-wide phenomenon. There's another, more subtle tribute to an icon that is sadly disappearing, as this "package" has an old Toys R Us price tag. Richmond Town Schedule

We have a better sense of the timing of the work to be done on the Transportation Building at Richmond Town after visiting the site. The building exterior is in much better shape than expected. The only scraping might be on the eaves and window frames. The side cladding is solid and is currently stained, not painted. If the opt to stain again, no priming will be needed. Week of April 9 is prep for painting; of April 16 for exterior signage; of April 23, two weeks for painting; of April 30, landscaping. Interior work would commence May 7 if all on track, with unveiling set for Uncorked! on June 2. We also toured the courthouse for a look at a future meeting place and were really knocked out by the chance to meet there. Aside from the main courtroom, which is equipped with a digital projector and large screen, there is the judges chambers, complete with a kitchen. Both are on the second floor, but accessible by stairs as well as a chair lift.





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
