

## Vintage Advertising

With the return of Bronco to showrooms next year, we look back at the one that started it for Ford back in 1966 and directly influenced the styling of the new model.

This ad features a Bronco Roadster without roof or doors, a Sport Utility with a short roof and doors, and a Wagon with a fully enclosed body. Ford brought these to market to compete with other compact "SUVs" like the Jeep CJ-5 and the International Scout. When it launched in August of 1965, it was powered by a 170 cubic-inch inline six. By March of 1966, an option for V-8 power came in the form of Ford's 289. These were all offered solely with a three-speed manual.

Ford rounded up 23,776 Broncos in its first year. We expect they'll need a much larger stable for 2021.

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
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


# Minutes of the 542nd Meeting July 7, 2020

# AACA Grand National Location Change

The AACA has announced that the 2020 Grand National meet will move from Allentown to Gettysburg. Issues in Allentown became insurmountable for hosting a show. The new location is on the grounds of Wyndham Hotel, which hosted an AACA Spring Meet in 2018. The location is large enough to meet state guidelines for an event, and safety protocols will be in place for the protection of all in attendance. Both the Wyndham and the adjacent Marriott have rooms at \$139 per night, with deadlines to register by August 6.

#### Inside the SIRAACA Garage

Once a car calls the SIRAACA Garage its home, it remains there even after it's physically gone. Here's one that once sat under its roof. It's a 1931 Ford Model A400, owned at the time by former member Andy Cannizzo.

The A400 is a convertible sedan, meaning the top goes down, but the door and window frames remain. Produced for less than one year, a total of 5,093 were built in the US, Canada and Buenos Aires. Body color keyed radiator shells for Ford were introduced with this model.

Before Andy became a Corvette expert, he was a Model A expert. This car was the peak of his restoration efforts, winning national awards, including an AACA Chocolate Town Trophy, awarded to the Most Outstanding Senior Car entered in a national Fall Meet.

Andy eventually was bitten by the Corvette bug, and his devotion to the split-window models has earned him the nickname "Mr. 63". While he was unavailable for comment before we went to print, some members recalled that the wheels on this Model A400 were painted and then cured in a pizzeria oven (after hours).

The SIRAACA Garage is home to all of our members' cars, past and present. Has your car been featured yet? Make sure you get the details to Paul Jr. if you want to share your car with us all.
