A Thanksgiving theme is served in this ad for the 1939 LaSalle, as the grandkids pop out of the spacious rear seat to greet grandma on her farm, startling her turkeys in the process.

LaSalle was introduced in 1927 as the companion marque of Cadillac, designed by Harley Earl. After early success, the Great Depression led to plummeting sales figures, and an overall rethinking of the companion marques.

By 1934, LaSalle was more Olds than Cadillac, but increased competition from the Packard 120 and Lincoln Zephyr pushed Caddy to reassert the LaSalle relation. LaSalle hung on through the 1940 model year. The '39 model seen here is easily identified by the large waterfall grilles that flank the narrow center one.

Inside the SIRAACA Garage

We return to the SIRAACA Garage for our first look at another Volkswagen found inside. It's the 1966 Beetle owned by Dennis Dell'Angelo.

His wife's stepfather bought the car new, and after tiring of the stick shift, gave it to them in 1970. They used it through 1974, and then put it in storage after the "1300" engine developed a bearing slap. It sat until 2008, when Dennis decided to rebuild the engine. The new owner of a shop Dennis knew of on Alaska Street pulled the engine and dropped a "1500" loaner in the bug while he worked on the original one. When finished, they swapped in the rebuilt one (or so Dennis thought). Years later, Dennis serviced the car at Pegasus Bug Shop in Linden, only to learn that the original "1300" engine was never returned to the car. 1966 was the only year for that engine, so the dishonest mechanic on Alaska Street kept it for himself.

Dennis is slowly restoring the car. The floors are done, the front end has been replaced and it's used every day. Dennis gets plenty of smiles from other drivers and onlookers, which is on of the reasons so many of love to drive our old cars.

We're starting to get the knack of setting the date on our SIRAACA Time Machine, and we are no longer dialed into just 1940. To demonstrate, we're visiting 1335 Castleton Avenue a few times in its history. At top left is Drinnan Garage, a dealer in Pontiac automobiles, circa 1940. Records show that Drinnan Garage was incorporated in 1922. Sometime later, perhaps in the late 1940's or early 1950's, it became Zilly Pontiac. At top right is our stop in 1965, when the dealership was Robin Ford. Robin Ford eventually moved

over to Richmond Avenue. Jumping ahead in time, we arrive in the mid-1980's, where the building was then home to Competition Center, an auto body shop (photo at right). Today, it's Ace Auto Salvage, selling new and used auto parts. Ace says it opened its doors in 1951, but clearly they weren't at this location for their first 35+ years. Does anyone know the history of Ace? In the meantime, we're keeping our flux capacitor in tip top shape and gearing up for another run back in time. We'll continue to target the old dealerships, and might stumble upon some other gems as we criss-cross the Staten Island of decades past.
