The Family Tree of National Awards

October means one thing in the AACA, and that's the Eastern Fall Meet in Hershey. The largest of its kind, Hershey remains the main show where AACA members in our region compete for national awards. Our club has a long track record of winning awards at Hershey, and with newer members joining our ranks, we thought it would be helpful to explain what it takes to win at the national level.

* Tieing Points must be above the respective minimum required.

** All participating vehicles at a Grand National are eligible to receive a Preservation Award if they score 350 points or above.

*** A Grand National Senior competitor is a vehicle which has previously won a Grand National First Prize. A Senior Award is won if the vehicle scores 390 points or above. The G.N. Senior can be won repeatedly.

All vehicles begin with 400 points, and deductions are made against a detailed judging sheet specific to ensuring the vehicle looks just as it did when delivered new. That's a combination of both condition and authenticity. There is a minimum point total required to win, and your car must score within the agreed spread of the highest scoring car in your class and award category. What does that mean? If you are going for a 1st Junior and score 380, you've met the minimum point total to win. If the top car in your class going for the same award scores 395, you end up with a 2nd Junior because you weren't within ten points of it. The chart above shows the points, spreads and hierarchy of awards to win at the national level. There are other paths to take as well, including Driver Participation and Historical Preservation. There is something for everyone, and we encourage all to experience the thrill of competing.

Here's another car that recently rolled in to the SIRAACA Garage, and it sure looked good doing so. This is Pat Colabella's 1967 Pontiac GTO.

Pat's car brings together the classic styling of one of the most popular muscle cars with modern upgrades. You quickly notice the 17" Foose wheels, and wonder what else has been done. Looking closer, you realize that it's riding on a new chassis, with four-wheel disc brakes.

Inside, you spot AC, power seats, locks and windows. The dash and console are customized, as is the sound system.

The drip rail has been shaved off and the body is finished in a Dark Cherry Pearl.

Stick shift, headers and dual exhaust play a muscle car soundtrack to complete the experience.

Pat recently scored 370 out of 400 points at a Pontiac national meet, and knows his dirty valve covers were mostly to blame for not scoring higher. Nonetheless, it's a great looking, driving and sounding addition to our Garage.

In conjunction with the launch of the GTO for 1964, Pontiac tasked its ad agency to sell their new factory hot rod to the world. That job was led by Jim Wangers, an accomplished drag racer who happened to work at the agency. His ideas included the famous GTO vs GTO (Ferrari) cover story for "Car & Driver", and the formation of a singing group called Ronny & The Daytonas to record the single "G.T.O." He also created a wildly popular GTO give-away through Thom McAn shoe stores in 1966, and was responsible for Dean Jeffries modifying a GTO for use as the Monkeemobile. With so much support, the GTO has become the quintessential American muscle car, and its lasting popularity among Pat and others is why Jim Wangers is known as the Godfather of the GTO. The SIRAACA Time Machine



We fired up the SIRAACA Time Machine for two passes by Schick's Garage, a large Dodge & Plymouth operation located where Bay Street meets Edgewater. The first pass in 1940 gave us the glimpse seen above. It looks like a 1936 Dodge facing us on the left. When we passed by ten years later, there were a number of changes that we noticed. All of the signage looks new, including a large billboard on the side of the building behind the garage. Sometime in between, Schick's stopped pumping Gulf in favor of Mobilgas. Lastly, it looks like their truck business had picked up after the war, which isn't surprising considering their well-earned reputation on the battlefield and the continuation of their "Job-Rated" offerings.

We have found local advertising from the 1920's showing that Schick's was dealing in the Overland and Willys Knight family of autos, including Whippet. The most recent Dodge ad we found for them was dated 1952. Do any of our readers know more?

For those identifying the cars in last month's photo, they were a '48 Nash and '50 Buick Super.
