

Did you know? By definition, the seven Custom Club Coupes were the first modern hardtops, beating out GM's 1949 models by three years. Apparently, no one noticed (or cared) at the time.

# Vintage Advertising

When you think of the first round of the post-war Chrysler Town & Country, you probably picture the Convertible Coupe or 4-Door Sedan. Chrysler had bigger plans for the T&C line that never came to pass. These are catalog illustrations from 1946 showing three other planned models - a Custom Club Coupe (2-door hardtop), a Roadster and a Brougham (2-door sedan). While Chrysler built 8,368 convertibles and 3,994 4-doors from 1946-1948, they built only seven Club Coupes, no Roadsters and maybe a prototype Brougham (at least the chassis for that is accounted for). The Convertible and Custom Club Coupes were built on the longer New Yorker chassis and featured a straight eight; all but 100 4-door sedans were built on the shorter Windsor chassis with an inline six.

This year marked a pair of firsts for our club and the annual Hot Rods & Harleys gathering in Rahway, NJ. While many of our members have been to this event in previous years, this time we were hired by organizers to help them with judging. In return for a \$1,000 donation to our club, nine members pitched in to evaluate hundreds of show vehicles displayed throughout the closed off streets of Rahway's City Hall area. In addition, several other members manned our club tent and raffle car, selling \$1,235 worth of chances. Despite a foggy start to the day, and a threat of rain that eventually came after 3:00 pm, the event was well attended by those who wanted to see the cars, enjoy street food and listen to live music.

#### SIRAACA at Grand Nats

This year's AACA Grand National Meet was held in Virginia Beach, and our club saw two members show their cars in competition for an award. Grand National Meets only allow entry to cars that have already won an AACA Senior Award. Congratulations to Andy Barcellona for winning a Second Grand National Award with his 1965 Thunderbird, and to Kevin Keenan for winning a Senior Grand National Award with his 1982 Riviera. The annual Grand National Meet is also where the 13 top restored cars shown at AACA annual meets the year before are gathered to compete for the Zenith Award. This year, that honor was given to a 1929 Du Pont Model G Club Sedan, one of just 25 made.

#### SIRAACA at Mecum Indy

Members Al Gargiulo and Joe D'Amore recently attended the Mecum Auction in Indianapolis and reported back that around 3,500 vehicles crossed the block, with selling prices ranging from decent to off-the-wall. Neither of them bought a car out there, so we can say with certainty that the 1969 Dodge Hemi Daytona 4-speed Super Track Pak (the most highly optioned Hemi Daytona known to exist) that sold for \$1.32 million won't appear inside The SIRAACA Garage.



#### From the President

How many of you know about the National Historic Vehicle Register? It's a program designed to preserve America's auto heritage, managed by the Hagerty Drivers Foundation in partnership with the U.S. Dept. of the Interior. So far, 32 vehicles have been documented for this program with their records permanently archived in the Library of Congress, and the two newest entries are a 1963 Chrysler Turbine Car and a 1952 Fabulous Hudson Hornet NASCAR racecar. These join 30 other cars, including the first Ford "Jeep", the Tucker prototype, the '68 Mustang used in "Bullitt", and the first car to win the Indy 500 in 1911 (the Marmon Wasp). The best part of this registry is the variety of vehicles on it. It matches the wide appeal of our hobby - old or new, restored or original, exotic or basic. There's something for everyone in our hobby, and each car holds significance to its owner through the story it tells. Have a look at the register online and see for yourself why a 1984 Plymouth Voyager minivan is as important as a 1921 Duesenberg, the first fiberglass Meyers Manx dune buggy or the DeLorean from "Back to the Future". - Paul Ir.

#### Raffle Car To Be at Food Truck Festival

Please remember that the raffle car will be at Mt. Loretto for the upcoming Food Truck Festival from June 10-12. The weekend event features plenty of good food and live music for all. #### \$142 Million Mercedes

\$142 million. Not a typo. It's been confirmed that Mercedes-Benz has sold one of the two famous 1955 SLR "Uhlenhaut" Coupes for that amount at a private auction. The price makes it the most valuable car in the world, and within the top 10 most valuable items of any kind sold at auction. Both coupes were always owned by M-B until now. They are named after chief engineer Rudolf Uhlenhaut, who created them to compete in the Carrera Panamericana race in Italy. They were capable of 180 mph and are as beautiful as they were fast. The buyer agrees to make the car accessible for public display on special occasions. The other coupe remains on display at M-B's museum. Proceeds will establish a Mercedes-Benz Fund to provide educational and research scholarships in environmental science. Check out the highlight video on RM Sotheby's website or YouTube.

### Inside the SIRAACA Garage

Once a car calls the SIRAACA Garage its home, it remains inside even if it's been sold, or the owner has moved on (kind of like the Hotel California, where "you can check out any time you'd like, but you can never leave"). So we present to you this month a 1966 Plymouth Belvedere II 426 Hemi convertible once owned by former member John Piazza.

John was the fourth owner of this rare car. It is one of only ten made, one of six with an automatic transmission, and the only one originally painted in Mauve Metallic. John treated it to a rotisserie restoration, using NOS and date coded parts in order to compete at the highest level MoPar events. John debuted the car at Hershey in 2004.

We recall seeing it sell at Mecum in Indy back in 2013, but aren't sure if John was the seller at that time. Last time we checked, this car was part of the private museum known as The Brothers Collection in Salem, Oregon. which may possibly be the most comprehensive collection of muscle cars in the world (look it up). Even so, it's still a car found in the SIRAA-CA Garage.

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#### The SIRAACA Time Machine

We dialed back the SIRAACA Time Machine over 100 years and found ourselves motoring alongside this stately early touring car (right). At the wheel was John D. Killian, but the type of car remains unknown, despite an ongoing debate that we started on the AACA Forums. Below is a local newspaper ad from 1920 pointing out Killian's company and his offering of Essex automobiles. We tried locating taxi driver Peter Antanozio to ask him about his Essex, but couldn't find any record of him. We then stopped at Pier 7 in Tompkinsville in 1927 to visit his display at the Staten Island Chamber of Commerce exhibition (bottom right). The sign in the center of the group of cars reads, "John D. Killian Auto Co./ Dodge Brothers/Graham Brothers Trucks". The latest reference we have to his company is a listing at 388 Bay Street in a 1933 Polk's directory.
